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## LANI'S LETTERS



Dear AO family,

By the time you read this letter, the High Holiday of Passover will have come and gone, and we will be in the final stretch of my Presidential year. While the calendar months have flown by, I am sure all of you can relate to the feeling time has stood still since 10/7.

Protests and rallies on the streets of Toronto celebrating the massacre, rape, and torture of Israeli civilians and accusing Israel of committing Genocide in Gaza persist. One hundred and thirty-three hostages remain in captivity for over half a year and Hamas proudly rejects every negotiation deal for their release. The silence of our colleagues, friends and neighbours is deafening. Each morning, I wake up and listen to the Times for Israel daily podcast in the hopes of some good news, but tensions continue to rise on all borders and the War against radical terrorism that Israel is fighting for the world is sadly far from over.

Antisemitism has risen exponentially across the globe, and it is palpable. In Toronto, 56% of the hate crimes committed in 2024 have targeted members of the Jewish community, which comprises less than 1% of the population. News outlets, influencers, educators and social justice warriors continue to fabricate or distort the facts, inciting hate and violence.

Israel on organized mission trips with DARA, Beth Tzedek congregation and several other organizations. While those who have visited the sites and witnessed the evidence of the atrocities committed by Hamas describe an emotional and deeply painful experience, they also returned home feeling inspired by the resiliency of the Israeli people. The spirit of Israel has not been broken by a horrific massacre of innocent lives. It has not been broken by 6 months of war resulting in the loss of loved ones, and it has not been broken by worldwide anti-Zionist rhetoric and Jewish hate. Am Yisrael is united, indestructible and resolute in its determination to achieve victory over Hamas for the security of the Holy Land and the entire world.

As Jews we are deeply committed to tikkun olam- repairing the world. This concept is such a cornerstone of our Jewish identity that is expressed daily in the prayer which concludes our morning, afternoon and evening services, Aleinu. The Aleinu is a prayer about our hope for the world to be united and at peace, for evil to be driven out, and for all of humanity to be united in a common vision of God. While the concept of tikkun olam had historically been understood as a Godly power, the Zionist movement gave it human agency. The establishment of a Jewish state was viewed as a holy endeavor to repair what had been broken 2,000 years earlier when Jewish sovereignty in Palestine ended. The existence of Israel preserves Jewish identity and heritage and secures our right as a people to self-determination.

Thus, the entire Jewish nation is at war to repair the world. We are fighting to support the Israeli people, for the release of our hostages, and to put an end to antisemitism. We are stronger united as a people and our collective determination is what will enable us to demonstrate the same perseverance as our ancestors throughout history.

Representing Alpha Omega Toronto during this dark period in our history has been emotionally challenging yet more spiritually rewarding than I ever could have imagined. It has been a true honour and privilege to serve

# FROM THE EDITOR



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

# Allen Heber



Dr. Allen Heber

In 1970, the University of Toronto, Faculty of Dentistry created a class of 129 students of various backgrounds and demographics. This became the Class of '74

In those days, intolerance and racism were not rampant, as they are today. There were males, females, older students and younger students, whites, blacks, Asians and people of a wide range of religious backgrounds.

Religious backgrounds are part of the invisible minority and I am sure that most students did not know of the religious backgrounds of their classmates and moreover, they never cared or overtly showed it.

Allen Heber, born October 26, 1948, was the product of holocaust survivors and a very Orthodox Jew. Yet, to his classmates, he was another student. The class of 1974 had students with diverse backgrounds in education, as well as their personal lives. There were those with Bachelor of Arts Degrees, Bachelor of Science Degrees, pharmacists and who knows what else?

Allen Heber had a background of a Bachelor Degree in Biblical Studies.

To his classmates, he was another student wanting to become a dentist. There was no competition between students, the only competitiveness was within yourself, to learn and do better each day. The Faculty of Dentistry recognized this in the two years that they adopted the Pass/Fail system, as opposed to the grade system

While Allen and I had planned to open a practice together upon graduation, the twelve thousand dollar investment in 1974 was too much for Allen; instead, he joined the practice of Dr. Tommy Kohn at the Jane-Finch Mall. He ultimately became the sole owner of the practice, where he worked until his untimely and unexpected passing on December 6th, 2023.

During the five decades, he also put in some time at his practice At Bathurst and Steeles and for a short time at the Peanut Plaza in Toronto, reflecting his relationship with Dr. Lou Fields

In both his practice and in his personal life, Allen emulated the way he was as a student. He never complained, grumbled and in my eyes, was outwardly always happy with a smile on his face. He was the eternal optimist.

During his student years and for the past forty-nine years of practice, he continued his biblical learning more than once a week, studying the nuances of the Old Testament with other likeminded individuals.

During his working years, he followed the precepts of Judaism and gave a large part of his earnings to charity, specifically the poor.

His family grew from his loving wife Annie, the twin daughter of a Toronto Rabbi, and together, they produced many wonderful children, most of which I had the privilege of knowing.

They included his oldest child and only daughter, Dahlia Stern, nee Heber, and four sons; Ari Heber, Rabbi Tzvi Heber, Rabbi Yehoshua (Josh) Heber and Avi Heber.

Aside from their formal education, the children were also home-taught the principles of their religion and heritage.

While dentistry has lost a valuable contributing and respected member of almost fifty years, his family and his community, which includes members of the Agudah Synagogue, and I, personally have lost a wonderful classmate, a respected colleague a beloved friend and expartner. His loss has created a vacuum in my heart, as well as in the hearts of the people who knew him, loved him and respected him

As our remaining class members will meet on April 18, 2024 to celebrate our 50th class reunion, we will certainly acknowledge his departure from our lives, as well as other classmates who have not survived until this time.

Allen passed away unexpectedly on December 6th, 2023 and was interred on December 7th of 2023.

The Pulvers attended many Chapnick family life cycle events including family seders. These were often attended by his late father Fred and loving late mother Celia, brother and AO member Paul Chapnick and wife Joyce.

Barry loved being around his kids. His son

Cary is married to Alana with granddaughters Ella and Ava, and son Stephen married to Dana and grandson Sonny.

Barry had a hearty laugh and an infectious smile. Barry was a good friend and his passing left a big void in my life, the life of his family and his many friends.

Barry is gone but he will not be forgotten. May his life serve as positive out look and role model for other Alpha Omegans.

# AI AND MORE



I was attending my cousin's birthday reception, and while sipping a cup of coffee and munching on delicious rugelach, I had a conversation with a charming, young (everyone seems young to me) lawyer, who I had not seen for awhile. I knew her long before she entered law school, and this was a chance to catch up. After passing her bar exams, she had a somewhat difficult few years, but now she was doing what she called her dream job. She neither writes briefs for criminal or defence litigants, drafts contracts, develops wills, manages family law issues, nor supervises real estate work. She was pleased to tell me that she was the manager of IT development for a very large law practice. Her job requires her to research innovative programs and applications, evaluate whether they would enhance the operation of the organization and if any are adopted, she is responsible for their implementation. Although she no longer practices law, her background is essential for her job since a typical IT support person would not have the legal background to effectively do the work. Although she loves the research and program evaluation, she commented that by far the most difficult part of the job was implementation. She asked if I had any experience initiating new processes and getting everyone on board.

From time to time, as a Chair of a Department and later, Director of a Dental School, I had to introduce a new procedure or technology. There seemed to be three user uptake categories for technology-driven innovation. Young faculty members were either aware of the application, were already using it, or were eager to dive in and adopt the program. However, many of the older faculty were not only reluctant but some were downright adamant that whatever the application, it was not better than the process they were currently using. Much of the implementation time was spent cajoling, mentoring, handholding, and retraining these faculty. The remainder of the time was spent on the largest group, those who were somewhat unsure, but curious enough to explore how the program could assist them in their work. "What about the refuseniks?," she asked. "How did you get them onboard?"

I remember when the entire University, which of course included the Faculty of Dentistry, planned to dispense with 35mm slides and Kodak Carousel projectors and convert to digital data projection of slides and videos. The refuseniks had no desire to learn how to use programs such as PowerPoint and interfacing with a lecture room AV computer console was too daunting. A few years went by with the IT staff installing data projectors, making network connections, ensuring security and privacy, all the while, struggling to maintain old slide projectors and remote slide-changing devices. Faculty budgets continued to be degraded by the money spent on cameras, film, film processing and graphic arts. After two years, we were instructed to stop paying for photographers, graphic artists, 35mm colour film and film processing and IT was directed to remove all slide projectors from lecture rooms across the entire campus. Although a few older faculty were unable or refused to change and decided to retire, most signed up for PowerPoint classes. "That's tough love." she replied. "How did you communicate the plan to your faculty?" For the most part we could call a faculty meeting and bring in the IT folks to speak directly to the entire faculty, so no one was singled out. "I wish that were possible. Our offices and partners are spread out across the province and many work from home. In fact, I rarely go to the office. I communicate by email, Teams or Zoom meetings. My messages have to be precise and unambiguous, so I use an Artificial Intelligence (AI) program to draft correspondence." When I heard the last remark, I instantly tripped over the generation gap.

Before I convey how AI assisted her, a definition is in order.

**ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE (AI)**, the ability of a digital computer or computer-controlled robot to perform tasks commonly associated with intelligent beings. The term is frequently applied to the project of developing systems endowed with the intellectual processes characteristic of humans, such as the ability to reason, discover meaning, generalize, or learn from past experience. Encyclopaedia Brittanica, Sept. 2023

When my young friend needs to compose a new document, she selects a string of key words which she determines are central to the context. She also chooses the length of the document by the number of words or paragraphs and she may also select the style, e.g., suitable for a program non-user. She clicks 'start' and within a few seconds, the document appears on her screen. She reviews it and may make edits or context modifications, for instance, - provide more detail on the program's editing function and show how it may be used in real estate transactions. Another click, and the new draft appears. She reviews the document to ensure that it satisfies her needs, signs it electronically, and off it goes to her email contact list for transmission.

"Is it a better document than what you could compose from scratch?" I asked. "Hard to say, however, I saved myself 30-40 minutes of time. I can use the time saved to do more productive work." The word 'but' immediately came to mind. But you did not really write the document, you did not apply your training, or composition skills, add context nuances, or indepth knowledge of your intended audience to create the document. My young friend looked at me quizzically. It is the endpoint that counts. Often the AI program finds references and examples that I had overlooked or would have taken hours of searching. I can ask the program to provide citations and references with a click of a button. The final document is often better than the one I could produce in the allotted time, considering all the projects I have on my plate. Innovative technology should be engaged and given a fair trial. Isn't that just how your university acted when it

did away with slide projectors?"

It is true that the elimination of 35mm slides was a sea change in how teachers prepared lectures, communicated research, and delivered continuing education material. At first, the digital slides were not necessarily better. The traditional graphic preparation, photography, film processing and slide assembly often produced excellent visual material - but with a little training and the added sophistication of PowerPoint subroutines, digital slides quickly became the standard. In time, new versions of the digital process evolved to provide a wide range of artistic and design choices that were completely beyond what was possible using the traditional model. For the University, after the initial capital cost of the data projection equipment, it was cheaper, and for the faculties, it was faster and safer. I would never have asked a member of my faculty to return to the old system. Just as I should not have questioned my lawyer friend about adopting her AI program for document preparation.

# HOLOCAUST MUSEUM TOUR

The AO Sunday Morning event, held as a group tour of the Toronto Holocaust Museum on Sunday, April 14th, was a deeply moving and impactful experience. A remarkable 70 of our members attended, filling the museum with a sense of unity and respect. The event commenced with a seminar led by child Holocaust survivor Andy Retí, who shared his mother Ibolya Reti's incredible story of perseverance while recounting his childhood memories of the terrible suffering and indescribable hunger in the Budapest ghetto during the War. Andy attributes his survival to the courage, resilience and sacrifice of his mother and grandmother. He believes that "every Holocaust survivor's story is a love story; the love of life, family and freedom." Andy's presentation was a profoundly moving testament to the human spirit in the face of unimaginable adversity.

Andy has been involved in Holocaust education since 1998. In 2001, he wrote The Son of an Extraordinary Woman — a sequel to his mother's book, An Ordinary Woman in Extraordinary Times, which was written in 1990. In 2016, the two books were combined and re-released as Stronger Together. Andy generously gifted us a copy of his book which will be made available to our members through Velarie at the AO office.

The tour continued with the viewing of a Virtual Reality film in which Holocaust survivor Pinchas Gutter takes the viewer on a walk through Majdanek death camp, where both his parents and his twin sister, Sabina, were murdered. My VR set overflowed with tears as the film evoked difficult emotions that I had not felt since walking through the same fields on the March of the Living in 2016. The technology was eerily realistic and I am so moved by the experience.

After the VR film, everyone had the opportunity to explore the museum's several exhibition rooms on their own time. It goes without saying that this event was most meaningful to all and served as a powerful reminder that good always triumphs over evil.

# I LOVE DOCTOR BROWN BUT...

Don't get me wrong as you peruse this recollection of mine. I'm not painting all dental staff with the same brush. But this was my one time, 'funny' experience, at my long time dentist's office the other day. Let's begin.

Since I was still shaking my head, and reliving my appointment, I decided to document it for posterity. As this transpired more than three years ago, posterity seems to be winning. It was a beautiful day. An unusually warm, sunshine filled November day. I walked from Cabbagetown, to my dentist's office at Yonge and Eglinton. It took about one and a quarter hours; a slight incline most of the way. When I arrived, my Fit had a heart reading of 85. "Not bad."

The hygienist was on time. A definite plus. I began by explaining my previous history with dental hygienists. Usually, within two weeks of my finished appointment, a tooth had broken, chipped, or cracked; or a filling had come out. So I asked her to be very gentle. I also explained that when she looked in my mouth, she would probably think I had not practised good oral hygiene. But in fact, I am very diligent in my dental hygiene. I felt this was enough of an explanation to prepare her for what she was about to find when I opened my mouth. Plus, she had my file. And had she been interested, it would have revealed many facts about my long dental journey. (Dr. Brown makes very extensive notes.) So, she picked up my chart and yelled, "This says you're 32!!" I guess that was the most interesting piece of information in my chart.

The actual appointment was about to begin. Here are the highlights. First, there were issues with the suction. (I never had any issues with Dr. Brown.) I was drowning. So I moved the hose, sat up, and swallowed. As I was about to explain this to her, she again vociferously interrupted with this - "I usually hook the suction over a molar. And you don't have any!" Possibly they don't cover the possibility of missing teeth in the Hygiene program. If not, they might want to consider adding that to the curriculum!

She began by sitting to my right, with my head lower than my feet. If not for gravity, this might have worked out well. Next, she moved her stool directly behind my head, and asked me to tip my head as far back as I could. I thought she might be pointing out the beautiful picture directly behind me at 12 o'clock. Never in 60 plus years have I had a dentist, or my head in this position. But what do I know? We continued. Finally when the treatment was over, she handed me the cup to rinse with, and as I lifted it to my trembling lips, in an alarmed voice she yelled - "Don't drink that!!" After they cleaned up my now pink top, we chatted a bit. My favourite bits of said conversation, follow.

"Maybe you were 32 when you started seeing Dr. Brown?" "Yes", I replied. "I've been coming to see Dr. Brown for over half my life." She responded - "I wasn't even born when you started coming here!" (Yippee for her!) "Are you eating OK?", she asked. "Yes?!" I replied. "But you don't have any bottom molars." she said. (So she was also observant.) When I left the appointment, my heart rate was 105.




