

WALK WITH ISRAEL

This year's Walk surpassed the participation rate and amount of money raised in 2024. 56,000 participants raised 1.4 million dollars. Who Was Rosalind Franklin?



Many years ago, I was chatting with one of our research faculty who was in the midst of writing a biography of William Bragg, the world class crystallographer who shared a Nobel prize with his son.* During our talk, he asked if I ever heard of Rosalind Franklin. I said "no" and he replied, "too bad." We went on to discuss other matters. A year ago, I came across a reference to the same Rosalind Franklin in an IDEAS.TED. COM article which focussed on overlooked women of science. The short TED article. claimed that Franklin was instrumental in the preeminent scientific discovery of the 1950's and perhaps the century - the double helical structure of DNA.

If you asked anyone who has taken at least a high-school biology class, read an article about evolution, immunology, epidemiology, genetics, or a host of other disciplines, they would know that the DNA double helix is the molecular structure responsible for our genetic continuity and the diversity of life on this planet. If you also asked, 'Who discovered the structure of DNA'? The answer would undoubtedly be — 'Crick and Watson.'

The IDEAS.TED article acknowledged that Crick and Watson came to their conclusion about the structure of DNA at about the same time, (or perhaps a little later), than Rosalind Franklin. In fact, both Crick and Watson and Franklin published their conclusions in the same issue of the same Journal (Nature, Vol. 171, 1953).

Editors of high-quality journals are instrumental in the acceptance or rejection of submitted papers. For those that pass this initial hurdle, the editor then determines the nature of the peer review. For subject matter that is esoteric or unique, the submitting author can make an intelligent guess as to the identity of the reviewers and vice versa. In these cases, there is little secrecy about what colleagues are doing. After the review process and suggested edits are completed, the editor plays a significant role in the placement of the article in a particular issue. When I think about the role that Franklin had in elucidating the structure of the DNA molecule, the placement of her paper, after Crick and Watson's seems deliberate, or at the very least, done knowingly.

Rosalind Franklin was born on July 25, 1920, in London UK. Her family would have been considered upper-class and socially wellconnected. Her father was an investment banker and her mother was the daughter of a prominent lawyer. The Franklin family was Jewish; a point glossed over in some biographies. Her father volunteered his time to teach science in a school for the less privileged and her mother donated time to help both the elderly and unmarried mothers. As the war in Europe was on the horizon, her family took in two young children fleeing the oncoming horror. When Rosalind won a scholarship, she donated the funds to help a poor student. This was a family which actively participated in Tikun Olam.

First a caveat. I know blessed little about crystallography and even less about using this difficult technique to tease out the atomic structure of molecules. Application of the technique requires a well-equipped lab, skilled technicians, and cooperative colleagues. It is not the type of scientific enquiry that can be done in a basement with little to no assistance. This essay will take a peek at Rosalind's relationships and interactions with colleagues rather than a critical assessment of her scientific contributions.

Rosalind was not one of those late bloomers. She was an inquisitive child who

excelled at school from the start. In 1931, when she was 11 years old, she entered a private high school for girls and excelled in science and math. A story is told that when she was fourteen, she won a prize of a book of her choice. She selected Eddington's, New Pathways in Science with themes that included quantum theory and subatomic energy. Although she tended to be rather shy and reserved, most biographers note that she could be difficult with teachers and was a fierce debater.

At eighteen years of age, with a war in Europe imminent, Rosalind left high school and was admitted to the University of Cambridge to study Natural Sciences. She fully participated in university life and joined a number of science clubs and the Jewish Society. By her second year, Europe was ensnarled in war. Her family was distraught and was torn between Rosalind continuing her studies or withdrawing to aid in the war effort. Fortunately, she continued her studies. In her second year, true to form, she complained about the quality of the chemistry lectures which caused a bit of a stir. She was right and by the next year changes were made. After three years she sat her exams and graduated with 2nd class honors, a result which was quite disappointing to her. The result, however, did not surprise her supervisor. Being a perfectionist with poor time management, she spent far too much time answering the first few questions, leaving insufficient time for the later ones. In spite of her disappointing exam results, she was awarded a research fellowship in physical chemistry. She began a study measuring the rate of polymerization reactions, in the lab of Dr. Norrish, who later received a Nobel Prize. Rosalind left after a year. She did not have a good relationship with her colleagues, did not like the work, and did not like Norrish. In 1942, with the war raging, she began a study of the porosity of coal, the essential source of energy used to fuel the war effort, let alone domestic light and heat. She was able to relate the porosity and size of the holes to the amount of energy produced when the coal was burned. She also observed that the size of the pores could allow coal to be used as a molecular sieve. Today, coal derived

sieves are used to extract oxygen from air. The work on coal was the basis for her Ph.D. awarded by Cambridge in 1945.

In 1947, Rosalind moved to Paris and joined Jacque Mering in the French Government's Central Laboratory. Lawrence Bragg, some 35 years earlier had used x-ray diffraction to study the location of atoms in crystals and derive the structure of molecules. Mering was attempting to use the technique on amorphous solids. Rosalind was intrigued by the process and started to apply the technique to coal.

It was not long before she became a world expert in this field of study. Rosalind was able to suggest the type of coal which could be transformed into crystalline graphite which was gaining importance in the effort to produce efficient nuclear energy.

Although Rosalind enjoyed Paris, in 1951 she returned to King's College, University of London to complete a biophysics postdoctoral fellowship. She anticipated working on the 3D structure of protein but there was a change in plan as Maurice Wilkins, the senior scientist, suggested that she look specifically at the structure of DNA. Just before she arrived, Wilkins doctoral student Raymond Gosling found that under specific circumstances the microfibers of DNA were crystalline. Although not fully accepted yet, there was a hint that these crystals might have a helical pattern. An x-ray study of the of these crystals could be used to define the structure of DNA. This was right up Franklin's alley.

Franklin, Wilkins, and Gosling began work on the problem sharing the same laboratory. It did not take long before Wilkins and Franklin's relationship began to deteriorate. Apart from the fact that Wilkins and Franklin had polar opposite personalities, their boss John Randall appeared to be an incompetent administrator and left both Franklin and Wilkins to sort out lab responsibility and seniority. This never happened. Rosalind's confrontational attitude discouraged any rapprochement with the reserved Wilkins and their relations remained frigid.

With her Paris experience, Franklin was soon making excellent x-ray diffraction studies of molecular DNA and within eight months she discovered that DNA was present in an A and a B form. The B form was the predominant type seen in human living cells. She presented this significant advancement at a colloquium a month later. Attending the meeting was James Watson from Cambridge. Watson and fellow Cambridge scientist, Francis Crick were also engaged in trying to understand the structure of the DNA molecule and they preferred to develop their ideas using physical models. After hearing Franklin's presentation, they sensed that their current model was wrong and invited the King's College team to join them in a meeting to discuss the problem. Franklin, who did not favour the physical model approach, and in her usual blunt style, soundly rejected their attempt. It was apparent that collaboration between Cambridge and King's would be unlikely.

On May 1952 Gosling took a diffraction picture of DNA B (#51), which was perfect and later became rather famous. It revealed a great deal about the structure of the double helix and the location of the molecular groups which held the helical components together. Franklin, always the perfectionist, delayed announcing the find because she wanted to understand why pictures of the A variety of DNA always appeared fuzzy.

Numerous reviews, biographies, and texts weigh-in to describe what occurred from this point in time until the publication of the 1953 articles in Nature. Each step along the way seems clouded by ego, competition, and jealousy. Meanwhile it became clear that the person(s) to first publish and inform both the scientific community and the public, would take a primary place in the history of science.

In my opinion the culture within the scientific world of the mid 1950's, may have contributed to Rosalind's treatment. Rosalind was an attractive young female in what was still in the 40's and 50's a predominantly male world of science. Yes, there were increasing numbers of females in physical and biological sciences but the

numbers were small and even fewer in senior positions. Rosalind was confident of her scientific skills and cared little if her bosses disagreed with her. She vigorously, and some may say, too forcefully defended her position, often inducing ire. She seemed to run afoul of the political and academic niceties and put her scientific research ahead of placating the feelings of colleagues. In addition, Rosalind was a Jew. In her early years she shared her family's tradition of religious practice but after she entered Cambridge University, she led a secular lifestyle. She continued to acknowledge Jewish culture and did not hide her Jewishness. I saw little evidence that anti-Jewish sentiment played a role in her scientific journey. However, I think I would be criticized if I suggested that it did not. Some might say that Rosalind was her own worst enemy. Her need for complete understanding and fulsome answer to every problem, while others were satisfied with gaining knowledge in an incremental manner, played a significant role in winning the race to the finish line.

Rosalind had chosen the technically difficult modality of x-ray diffraction to disclose the location of atoms in the molecular chain. Picture #51 produced by her and Gosling was the core piece of evidence used to satisfactorily answer the question of the molecular structure of DNA and demonstrate its double helical form.1 The picture, although factually comprehensive to scientists was visually impenetrable to the lay observer. However, the models used by Watson and Crick were visually appealing. Anyone who has followed the history of the developing understanding of the structure of DNA, remembers the entertaining photographs of Crick and Watson hovering over their colourful double helix model made with children's construction sticks and connectors.

The 1953 Nature article by Crick and Watson was written during the period when the sensitivities between King's College and Cambridge were still somewhat frayed. Crick and Watson mentioned the contributions of other investigators but did so using cool and less than fulsome language. "We were

stimulated by a knowledge of the general nature...of unpublished results and ideas of ...Wilkins, Franklin.. and co-workers at King's College." But, in a 1961 communication from Crick to the French Biologist, Jacques Monod he states "However, the data which really helped us to obtain the structure was mainly obtained by Rosalind Franklin...". In 1962 Crick, Watson and Wilkins were awarded the Nobel prize in Physiology or Medicine. At that time, the rules did not allow posthumous awards and Franklin who had died in 1958 was overlooked. As the years past and the significant contributions that Franklin made to chemistry, the structure of DNA and viruses became known, she received numerous posthumous awards and notes of recognition. An article in Wikipedia² lists most of her awards given in the last 30 years. In 1998, the National Portrait Gallery in London, added her portrait, next to portraits of Francis Crick, James Watson, and Maurice Wilkins. In 2022, as recognition of her significant contribution to virology and her discovery of the 3D structure of the tobacco mosaic virus, a new bacteria genus was named Franklinella. Just recently, I was surprized when I asked a third-year dental student 'Who discovered the DNA double helix?' She said without hesitation 'Crick. Watson and Franklin.'

It was a cruel act of fate that in 1957 Rosalind was diagnosed with inoperable ovarian cancer. The two risks factors at work were her Ashkenazi genetics and likely excessive workplace radiation exposure. Her radiation detection badge often showed that she was excessively exposed, but no one was courageous enough to forcibly get her to use barrier protection. After a heroic fight she died on April 16, 1958, at 37 years of age and was interred in the United Jewish Cemetery in Willesden, London

I took the statement at face value and was tempted to simply consider the event as an example of old-fashioned dumb luck. But was it?



As most of you know, the dental clinic in Jerusalem serves the very poorest in the city – regardless of race, religion or colour. The clinic provides restorative dentistry, prosthodontics with an in-house lab and endodontics all at no charge to the patients. Holocaust survivors, the elderly, pediatric patients - all are taken care of.

The clinic is powered by a robust volunteer program, through which dentists from around the world - many from Toronto AO - donate their time and expertise each year for stints of a week or so, typically 4 days a week.

In an email from the director of Development International Relations, Michele Manspeizer, I learned that the 40+ year old clinic is now facing an extreme financial crisis. The Dental Volunteers for Israel lacks over \$200,000 USD in its budget! As a point of information, staff costs alone (hygienists, assistants, reception and administrative staff) total close to \$360,000 CD a year!

The reasons aren't hard to understand.

With Israel fighting wars on multiple fronts for 2 years, philanthropic attention has shifted toward immediate humanitarian relief and security needs in Israel - think of the evacuees from the northern border fleeing Hizbollah, and the evacuees fleeing settlements near the Gazan border.

Moreover, these events have redirected local philanthropic giving in Israel toward urgent wartime and social welfare responses, making it more challenging for organizations like DVI to secure domestic support.

Internationally, war and instability in Israel can raise donor concerns, delay funding decisions, and affect operational planning for volunteers and partners abroad.

Additionally, the rise of antisemitism here and in Europe has forced many foundations to pivot funds that were usually spent in Israel to address domestic security, community resilience and humanitarian needs.

With that, DVI is still providing much needed services and treatments.

As dental professionals in the world's fourth largest Jewish country we can't sit idly by and watch the Dental Volunteer Clinic suffer calamity!

We need to take steps to raise much-needed funds and the Canadian Friends fo the DVI are looking forward to engaging as many Toronto AO members to make that happen.

To this end we are excited to announce that we are in talks with the Toronto Magic Company to provide entertainment for a gala event being planned for the spring of 2026. the principals of the entertainment company, my son Ben Train and his partner Jonah Babbins, have appeared twice on Penn and Teller's Fool Us and have done many corporate and private events internationally, as well as shows at Yuk-Yuks, the Art Gallery of Ontario and the Allied Music Centre at Massey Hall here in Toronto.
